

MVLA Adult School Programs Enrollment Trends



Unduplicated enrollment by Adult Education Programs, 2019-2020, shows an overall 24% decrease in all programs due to the COVID-19 shutdown March 16, 2020. MVLA Adult School immediately transitioned to Distance Learning to provide students with educational and community interest opportunities.


- 1. Expanded the use of instructional technology including Google Docs and Slides, Newsela, and Kahoot to build background knowledge and supplement instruction. These programs are used in daily instruction and are accessible through Google Classroom. GED began using the Paxen Focus online textbooks as an additional assessment and to promote students learning outside of class time.
- 2. ASE teachers attended webinars from Outreach and Technical Assistance Network (OTAN) and GED that focused on how to use different technology platforms to engage and support students for distance learning. GED teachers attended a training workshop from Paxen Focus to learn how to navigate the online textbooks, monitor student progress, and provide timely feedback.
- 3. Expanded tutoring services to students during the daytime and the summer to increase access.

High School Diploma/GED Highlights

- The number of high school diploma graduates doubled in 2019-20 compared to previous year.
- 61 concurrent and 10 Moffett seniors completed 5+ credits toward graduation
- 74% completion for the 2020 Online Summer School




ASE and ABE Unduplicated Enrollment




Even though the population in Mountain View area has decreased due to high cost of living, enrollment in ASE and ABE has remained relatively stable over the last three years.

Concurrent, Moffett and YPP Unduplicated Enrollment




There was a slight decrease in the number of Moffetts and Concurrents served in 2019-2020. There were no YPP students served.

MVLA Adult School HS Seniors Who Earned Diplomas




Concurrent and Moffett completions refer to unduplicated high school seniors who completed at least one class at the adult school in their final year.

MVLA Adult School HSD/GED Benchmarks



In 2019-20, there was a decrease in the number of students who completed the National Reporting System (NRS) educational level due to the inability to post-test during the pandemic. The number of students who earned a high school diploma doubled compared to the previous schoolyear.

MVLA Adult School Online Summer School Data



A total of 839 MVLA high school students registered for the MVLA Adult School Online Summer Program in 2020. Of the 406 students who participated, 74% of the students completed the course. Some of the students opted to take the district's distance learning summer school.

Evidence


- ESL teachers and students built technology skills to work online together via Zoom. EL Civics unit focused on online vocabulary and tools. New online curriculum including e-books and online practice materials for all students.
- Instructors trained in new curriculum/online learning tools by publisher. Level-group teams meet to discuss best practices for online instruction and asynchronous practice. Coordinators facilitate via weekly office hours for staff mentoring and tech support. In-Service PD sessions in October, January and March focused on teaching writing and enhancing online instruction.
- New weekly facilitated conversation groups to give higher-level students additional speaking practice (expanding to lower levels in spring). Tech Advocates will assist students 1-on-1 to overcome tech barriers.

English as a Second Language (ESL) / Citizenship Highlights

- Strong student retention with Distance Learning
- Offered technology training and collaboration time for staff; asynchronous practice and LMS for students
- Checked out iPads to students who needed them; provided online textbooks and practice materials to all
- Redesigned ESL online placement testing and orientation sessions
- Systematized outreach to previous students; streamlined class placement for returners




MVLA Adult School ESL Payment Points




In 2019-2020, the last two post-test opportunities did not occur because of the COVID-19 schoolwide shutdown in the spring. No new students entered the ESL Program between March and June 2020 as we shifted to distance learning.

MVLA Adult School EL Civics Payment Points



In 2019-2020, there was only one EL Civics unit completed by all classes. During the second EL Civics unit, the school went into shutdown due to the COVID-19 pandemic and some but not all classes had completed this assessment. The third EL Civics unit was not taught because of the transition to distance learning.

MVLA Adult School Percentage of ESL Students Passing EL Civics Tests



In 2019-2020, the second EL Civics unit was interrupted during assessment so not all students who were taught the unit were tested. The third EL Civics unit was not taught nor assessed due to the COVID-19 shutdown.

Career Technical Education (CTE) Highlights

- CTE courses successfully transitioned to distance learning and continued to achieve high performance completion rates
- CTE completion rate 80%, which was a 2% increase from last year's which was 78%
- American Red Cross written test pass rate of 95%, which was a 2% increase from last year



Evidence


- 1. CTE successfully transitioned from classroom-based instruction to DL during the pandemic and has provided additional staff development workshops and work 1:1 with staff tech training as needed.
- 2. CTE instructors attended the Back to School in-service event, staff development workshops, and at beginning of the pandemic, attended staff meetings on a weekly basis. Instructors reviewed third party test results, identified areas for improvement, and incorporated new teaching strategies in lesson planning to improve student learning outcomes.
- 3. Office hours has been utilized as an alternative to work 1:1 with students. We continue to assess the need for tutoring and provide additional academic support as needed on an ongoing basis.

CTE Unduplicated Enrollment by Industry Sectors




CTE courses transitioned to distance learning during the pandemic

MVLA Medical Office Assistant (MOA) Pass Rates Compared to National Pass Rates




Note: 2019-2020 data reflects a very small sample and does not include all 4 quarters due to NCCT delays in combining school performance data.

MVLA Adult School Transition Highlights


- ESL Transitions/Goal-Setting Unit for Intermediate and Advanced ESL students offered for the past 3 years
- Classroom Transition Presentations from Career Tech, GED, Foothill-DeAnza Community College District, MVLA transition adviser
- . Community College field trips to Foothill College and Mission College
- Classroom instruction in:
 - Defining and setting goals (ESL, GED and Pre-GED)
 - > Internet research on adult school and community college websites
 - U.S. educational system (ESL)
 - School and education-related vocabulary (ESL)
 - Writing about goals and steps to reach a goal (ESL, GED and Pre-GED)
- **GED collaboration with ESL** through classroom visits during Spring 2019 semester and special orientation targeted for ESL students led to the **initial transition of 14 ESL students** into the morning GED program at the start of Fall 2019
- Student Transition Plans with transition adviser
- NSCCC Transition Commitments

MVLA Adult School Transition Advising Services

Transition services include individual advising appointments with students and resume workshops provided in core program classes.







